

NHS AUGUST 9 PROGRAM FEATURES THE LIFE OF BILLY B. VAN, by Cathryn Baird

Billy B. Van is credited with coining Newport's nickname, The Sunshine Town." He owned a Guernsey dairy farm on Spring Street, which later became the production site of his Pine Tree Products business. Van bought an old book for 10 cents, called, Chemistry at a Glance," and then experimented mixing products to make his Pine Tree Soap. Van was also a nationally-known motivational speak-

er. Before he was involved in any of these undertakings, however, he was a well-known vaudevillian and Broadway

He lived in Georges Mills in the early 1900s and nicknamed the village "Van Harbor." His best friend was Lee Collins, who went on to become a choreographer for

the Ziegfeld Follies. Later, Collins took over his father's clock museum in Georges Mills. As an actor, Van coined the work "Skidoo" related to "skedaddle" and "23 skidoo" meaning "get out of here." The following alphabet acrostic highlights some of Van's activities:

NEWPORT NOTABLE by Cathryn Baird John Cooper McCrillis

May 30,1930 - June 21, 2016

John Cooper McCrillis was born in Newport NH, the son of John Wilmarth McCrillis and Hester Laura Cooper and a descendant of John Wilmarth, who settled in Newport in the late 1700's. John was a lifelong resident of "The Sunshine Town". He attended Newport schools, graduated from Kimball Union Academy in 1948 and Dartmouth College in 1952. Following his graduation from Dartmouth College, he served in the United States Army during the Korean War era with a tour in Germany. After his discharge from the Army, John worked for the Old Colony Trust Company of Boston, MA, during which time he met the love of his life, Katharine Cooper Wood of Bedford, NY. They were married June 27, 1959 on the island of Maui, Hawaii. In 1963 he moved back to his hometown of Newport, where he joined the family insurance agency, McCrillis and Eldredge (Est. 1890), as a principal and owner, until his retirement in 1992. In 1991, John was honored as the Newport Area Chamber of Commerce's Citizen of The Year, as he was recognized for his lifetime of service to Newport, representing the best in purpose, competence and reliability.

John was a Founding Partner of Hospital Hill and Summercrest Assisted Living Facility and a Founding Partner of the Newport Tennis Club. As a founder of the Newport Nordic Club he was instrumental in having the 30 meter Olympic ski jump moved from Lake Placid, NY, to Newport. He supported the local community through his participation on many boards and involvement with numerous charitable and service organizations. He truly was a dedicated, active citizen who quietly served others with humility and grace. It is with great respect for John and his contributions to Newport

What lies ahead for this grand, old, proud building is uncertain.

Forthcoming book by Jayna Hooper

"Forget whatever petty, personal feelings you may have and let us get together and DO SOMETHING, BE SOME-THING; and above all, don't be a pessimist!" So wrote Billy B. Van to the citizens of Georges Mills in 1913. The natives weren't too keen on Billy's idea of changing the name of their post office to Van Harbor. "Now, I desire cooperation of every man, woman and child in the vicinity who might be interested in the advancement of mankind."

Billy B. Van was serious. Vainglorious, (maybe just a little?) but serious. From the 1890s through the 1920s, when vaudeville was America's form of mass entertainment, Billy was one of its leading and highest paid stars. And much like today's major Hollywood stars, Billy earnestly ascribed to the most progressive of society's causes and ideas. In the pre-World War I years, those ideas included a brash confidence in a rapid, commercially expanding U.S., guided by scientific principles. "We need an electric light plant," Billy's plea to the people of Georges Mills continued, "better sidewalks, good roads, a modern, sanitary school house, better fire department equipment, a first class hotel, and above all a class of people who will build homes and furnish employment for

the natives."

Well, even though Van left behind bucolic Georges Mills in 1920, it was these ideals that propelled him for the remainder of his life. This was evident in his enthusiasm for developing cutting edge dairy practices and inventions; his pursuit for a hygiene product made only of the best ingredients; his early involvement in the most groundbreaking forms of entertainment – motion pictures in the 1910s,

radio in the 1920s; his energetic contributions to the emerging fields of marketing and advertising; as well as his pioneering role in the establishment of the "human relations" sector in business.

And through it all, Billy B. Van promoted Newport as "The Sunshine Town" and touted the principles of caring and community that made it "depression-proof" even in the midst of economic downturn. Hard times didn't dampen the spirit of "The Sunshine Town," and neither did they dampen Billy's.
